


Books to Check Out—Concepts, Shapes, Colors



"the complete book of concepts for growing minds—shapes, colors, numbers, letters, opposites."



Beside size, and black and white, this book follows the life of two cats (and their relationship) from young to old, life and passing. Simple text and illustrations (black and white).



Book of opposites—bear, mouse, and friends badger, hare, wren, owl, mole, gopher, raven introduce and repeat big, small, fast, slow, low, high, loud, quiet, warm, cold. Delightful little story with pleasant pictures, simple text. Of course one could talk about pretend and reality.




Book of opposites (different)—brief stories intertwined with big, little, dirty, clean, happy, sad, wet, dry, high, low, tall, short, up, down, in, out, open, closed, hot, cold, noisy. Brings up relative sizes, and "If . . . (conjecture). Golden Tell-A-Tale




Opposites—papa and son. Very simple text (rated for preschool, kindergarten), such as "Big bear. Small bear. Small hat, big head. Big hat, small head. Too small. Too big . . ." Humor.




Hats, again. Lots of descriptive words, including opposites; rhyming, entertaining story.




What happens when a small bear gets in a box? He literally gets carried away. Very simple text, humor. Good chance to talk about whether to get into places that may have unexpected consequences.




Opposites. Ernie and Bert are great friends, even though they have different likes and dislikes. Up, down, big, small, through, around, different, same, near, far, top, bottom, yummy, yucky (personal preference), on, off, outside, inside, over, under, open, closed, in, out . . . "we do like the same things . . . in different ways." Beginning, end.




Opposites with dogs . . . don't miss the front and back covers. Dark, light (black & white), fast, slow, short, tall, up, down, light (weight), heavy, in, out, few, many, under, over, asleep, awake, little big. One word per page.




Simple rhyming text in large font, few words. Cute illustrations. Top, bottom, inside, outside, happy, sad, silly, mad, fingers, toes, ears, nose, giggles & cries, running, walking, silent, talking, yesterday, today, tomorrow.



Board Book—big/small, long/short, day/night, black/white, dry/wet, over/under, up/down, behind/in front, hot/cold, inside/outside. Extras: open/closed, soft/hard, end/beginning. Each used in a sentence, with cute illustrations. Look for colors, shapes, patterns, etc. Borders top and bottom each page have more details that can encourage conversation and observation.



Spanish, but easily translatable from the illustrations, about 3 words per page. Large & small, short and tall, above and below, fast and slow, very heavy and very lightweight, awake and asleep, inside and outside, whisper & scream, weak and strong, right (correct) and wrong, hot and cold, young and old, wet and dry, hello and goodbye. Humor and the quaint drawings of Sandra Boynton.




A bilingual story, more involved—may need summarizing for young children. Two friends have a humorous adventure with opposites. Spanish and English. Can also discuss what to do when things go wrong on a vacation, and problem solving.

<u>Patterns</u> pieced cloth booklet for young children (includes shapes) created by Susan Ternyey. Two page spreads below:










Focused on star shape, various patterns, done in black and yellow.



Colorful Shapes—bilingual Spanish and English vocablulary. Circles, wheel, orange; triangles, flags, sails; squares, clock, puzzle; rectangles, cassette (historic), paint box; diamond, candies, kite; stars, starfish, stickers; rings, doughnuts, rubber ring (life saving); ovals, egg, balloons; hearts, sunglasses, soaps; cubes, present, soft blocks; tubes (cylinders), can, drum; natural forms: shell & leaf.




Colors—bilingual Spanish/English vocabulary: yellow duckling & sunflower, pink ballet shoes & piglets, green leaf & frog, purple flower & button, orange pumpkin & juice, blue butterfly & jeans, brown donkey & bread, black shoe, white bunny, gold beetle, silver star, ladybug spots, tiger stripes, multicolored parrot & ball.



Cloth book from a printed fabric. English/Spanish/French colors and vocabulary.



Colors and simple vocabulary; opportunities for counting at the bottom of each 2 page spread—bilingual Spanish and English.



Colors and simple vocabulary (5 items per color)—bilingual Spanish and English. Spanish pronunciation at end.




Colors—bilingual Spanish and English, simple vocabulary: red cherries and rose, orange orange and pumpkin, yellow sun and lemon, green leaves and frog, blue sky and flower, purple eggplant and plum, brown chocolate and shoes, white cat, black dog, grey horse.



Spanish, but easily translatable from the illustrations (remember "Ay, caramba!" from the Addam's Family, and Bart Simpson?). Just fun. Animal friends wear the colors red, green, blue, and yellow—hat, shirt, pants, coat, socks, shoes—but turkey always gets it wrong, until the end, he's dressed just right, but . . .




Colors and Muslim culture, including gold and silver.




Everybody's favorite (except me), Eric Carle—lots of colors, repetition (What do you see? ...), anticipation, rated for preschool/kindergarten readers. Animals: brown bear, red bird, yellow duck, blue horse, green frog, purple cat, white dog, black sheep, goldfish.



Simple text, few words in large font. Each of the cars is a different color.




A leopard may not be able to change its spots, but this animal can change them from one color to another. He's not right for the zoo, he's told, but . . .



Primary colors and mixing them to make secondary colors; also white and grey.




Primary colors and mixing them to make secondary colors; also white and brown.




Based on the song, includes a white duck, a green frog, black bug, and red snake, and the sounds they make.




Books for the color red. (There are tons of books for red).







Books for the color orange. (There are also various stories about orange colored cats.)








Books for the color black.










Books for the color pink. (There's also Piglet in Winnie the Pooh stories, many versions of the 3 pigs, etc., and Pinkalicious stories).



Books for the color grey.




