Walt Disney's Three Little Pigs (Little Gold Book)

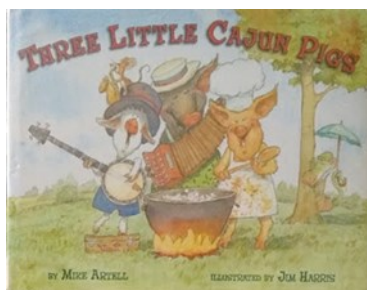

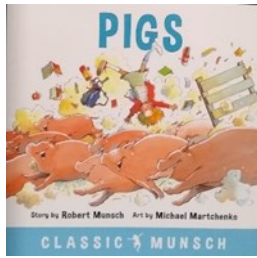

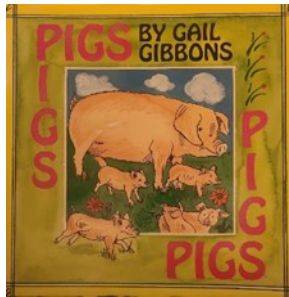
Three Little Cajun Pigs by Mike Artell

Non-fiction. Nice illustrations, pretty comprehensive but brief text in large font. Reading level grade 2. Read-aloud for K.

Non-fiction. Great photos, limited text in large font discusses characteristics of wolves, their prey, habitat, food web. Vocabulary & reading strategies at end. Reading level grade 1

Activities:

- Look for other adaptations of The Three Little Pigs, or make up your own. (see [Three Little Dinosaurs](#), [Three Little Mermaids](#), [Three Little Owls](#), [Three Little Sisters](#), [Three Little Bunnies](#), [Three Little Ducks](#), . . .)
- Present one of the stories above with flannel board, puppets, or by retelling. with actions.
- Build a house with whatever materials you can find around your home.
- Sing “Who’s Afraid of the Big Bad Wolf”
- Discuss work before play, responsibility, consequences.
- Talk about/try different meats we get from pigs, such as ham, bacon, sausage . .
- How do different cultures think about pigs, such as the Chinese Zodiac.
- Collect some pig sayings.
- What other rhymes & stories are about 3 of something? (kittens, goats, bears . . .)
- What other stories, folk tales, fables, or nursery rhymes have a wolf in them?
